At the November 11th City Council Meeting, Mayor Damman and the new Council took office. During this meeting, City Council Members elected Harry "Duke" Dunn as the new Mayor Pro Tem. New Council Members Appointed!!!!

At the December 16, 2013 City Council Meeting, the current council chose two new council members to fill the vacant council seats. These seats became vacant when Dan Damman was elected Mayor and current Council Member Tom Anglebrandt resigned at the November 25, 2013 meeting. Eleven residents submitted applications to fill the two seats. At the December 16 meeting City Council chose Rita Hendricks to fill Mayor Damman's vacant council seat and then chose Michael Buggy to fill Tom Anglebrandt's seat. The new council members take oath of office immediately and will be seated at the next City Council Meeting on Monday, January 13, 2014. Mrs. Hendricks and Mr. Buggy's council term expires November 2015.

City Manager Comments: “2013: The Year in Review”

Many tasks need to be performed to keep the City of Marysville running efficiently. From the extraordinary to the mundane, all accomplishments contribute in making our city a good place to visit and a better place to live. The following are some of our city’s highlights during the past year:

Assessing: In conjunction with our Finance Department, the Assessor worked with the Economic Development Alliance to keep or transfer tax abatements for local businesses. These abatements encouraged businesses to remain in our community. Our Assessor also settled many tax appeals to reduce liabilities for local businesses and residents.

Community Development: The Community Development Department secured grants from various State of Michigan sources for the following projects in our city: Shoreline Restoration (along River Road near the golf course) - \$1.5 million; Chrysler Beach - \$500,000 and \$239,900; and the River Road Reconstruction Project – Mack Avenue to Davis Road - \$750,000.

Department of Public Safety: Public Safety conducted directed patrols and a public awareness campaign after a string of larcenies involving the theft of automobile contents occurred. Three arrests were ultimately made because of the campaign. Public Safety also replaced 12-year-old duty firearms and a dictation system that unexpectedly failed and managed to still stay in budget.

Department of Public Service: Providing \$95,000 worth of in-kind services, the Department of Public Service constructed the elevated boardwalk at the Shoreline Restoration Project. The DPS also rebuilt all other riverfront foot bridges. DPS crews cut and maintained more than 170 acres of grassy, city-owned property. These areas include 10.5 acres in Riverlawn Cemetery; 10 acres surrounding city buildings; 68.5 acres of parks; and 82 acres of right-of-ways throughout the city.

Finance: Accomplishments of the Finance Department involved cost-saving strategies. These included redesigning utility and tax bills into postcard format to save postage and labor costs. Finance also partnered with Community Development in times of staff shortages to ensure that residents are promptly served.

Golf Course: Major accomplishments for the golf course included creating a sand trap on Hole #8 and the acquisition of nine new pieces of mowing, aerating and topdressing equipment.

Recreation: Besides offering many new programs for all ages, the community center received a few new improvements such as: a new roof, new tile in the hallways, and the addition of another girls bathroom. The Recreation Department also received a grant from DTE to replace 12 trees in the city park that were cut down due to the affects of the Ash Bore Disease. These trees were planted in the spring of 2013.

Waste Water Plant: The Waste Water Plant replaced a chlorine feed pump and related instrumentation and programming with all in-house personnel. Staff also designed and installed an automatic secondary clarifier weir cleaning system.

Water Plant: The water plant began Phase I of its \$4.7 million project which included replacing the plant’s roof. The plant’s intake project was also completed for \$348,000. The water plant began water sampling for the St. Clair County Health Department which will generate a profit of \$25,000.

Water Quality Tip everyone can use!

Yes, we can keep our rivers healthy in the winter too! Shovel snow and ice early and often to limit your use of sand, salt and deicing chemicals. When safety requires it, try an alternative to salt. Magnesium chloride has fewer adverse environmental impacts and are not as corrosive. Check labels to choose a deicer that fits your conditions and apply it early and sparingly. Let the sun do its work, and only salt areas in the shade.

Marysville Trash Guidelines

- **Wednesday is our city’s scheduled pick-up day.** Trash, recycling, compost and bulky items must be placed at the curb by 7 a.m. on Wednesday to be removed that day. Our ordinance prohibits placement before 6 p.m. the night before. No larger than a 32-gallon trash can is permitted. The time of day refuse will be removed may vary depending on the volume of refuse being disposed of in the city.
- **Bulky Items:** Place by curb before 7 a.m. on Wednesday year-round. Call the DPS at (810) 364-8340 to check if an item is acceptable.
- **Paint: Must be completely dried.** To dry, please leave the lid off and put cat litter inside can to absorb paint. Set it *next* to your trash can.
- **Recycling: Glass:** clear, brown or green food or beverage bottles or jars; rinse clean and discard lids; labels do not need to be removed. **Cans:** tin or aluminum, etc.; rinse clean and remove labels. **Plastic:** milk, water jugs, etc. with the #1 or #2 plastic symbol; rinse clean and discard caps. **Newspapers:** no glossy prints, **black ink ONLY. ITEMS NOT ACCEPTED IN BLUE BINS: cardboard, pizza or cereal boxes, office/junk mail paper.** Corrugated cardboard boxes can be deposited in large bin at our DPS yard at 200 East 14th Street. No packaging **2**

City Tidbits.....

Lock Your Vehicles!

Residents, please lock your vehicle—even in your own driveway! This helps to deter the “car hoppers,” who are generally youth, traveling from vehicle to vehicle in residential areas, checking to see if vehicles are unlocked and stealing things from those that are not locked.

Dogs

Dogs are allowed on public property and in city parks, if the dogs are ON a LEASH. City ordinances also require that the person in control of the dog must have in his or her possession a bag, container or other visible means for removing dog feces.

Vehicles Blocking Sidewalks

As a reminder, blocking a sidewalk or walking area with your vehicles is a violation of our city ordinances. Please check each time that you park your vehicle to ensure that it does not block the sidewalk or walking area.

Chrysler Beach Gazebo can be Reserved

Starting April 1, 2014, Marysville Residents can reserve the gazebo for weddings in 2-hour blocks. Permits cost \$25 and must be purchased in person at the Recreation Department. Reservations are accepted for Fridays, Saturdays, Sundays; May—September. Non-Residents may reserve the gazebo starting May 1 for \$50. Driver's License is required at the time of permit purchase.

Indoor Walking

Reminder to our Residents that the Marysville High School is open on school days from 4-8pm for walking. Residents are asked to wear clean shoes in the hallways and not disturb other activities that may be going on in the building during those hours. This program is free. Residents enter through the special events entrance of the school, and do not need to check-in with any staff.



News from the Department of Public Safety

Is Your Heat Sources Ready for Winter!!

Home heating comes from a multitude of sources. Often times residents will supplement their main heating system with alternative heat sources such as fireplaces, wood stoves, and portable fuel or electric heaters. It's important to reach residents in your communities early with alternative heating fire safety information so you can stop the fire before it starts.

Heating is one of the leading causes of home fires in the United States. Over 25% of these fires started due to improperly maintained heating equipment. Tell residents that following a few simple safety tips can make all the difference:

- Have chimneys professionally inspected and cleaned each year;
- Ensure wood stoves are properly installed;
- Make sure space heaters are kept at least three feet away from flammables and have an emergency tip-over, shut-off control;
- Use a glass or metal screen in front of the fireplace to prevent sparks from igniting drapes, furniture, and carpets; and
- Never use a range or oven to heat your home.

Marysville Police Explorers

The Marysville Police Community Service Unit is proud to introduce Police Exploring. This is a program run in conjunction with the Boy Scouts of America, which introduces the youth of our community to Law Enforcement Training. The program has been in place now for thirteen years and has been a total success, thanks to a generous contribution made by our own Marysville Lions Club. This program would not have been possible without their support and faith in our youth of tomorrow. Currently the department has nine explorers ranging from ages 14 to 21, all of which volunteer their time once a week to learn the job tasks of a police officer. All of the department's Explorers will be in uniforms designating them as Explorers. They will be utilized during special events such as parades, Art in the Park and Marysville Days.

The purpose of the association is to facilitate and augment crime prevention activities by the Marysville Police Department in its effort to eliminate criminal activities in the City of Marysville. The C.A.P.T.U.R.E. Association is an incorporated, non-profit organization that seeks donations from the community to help fund their programs, such as National Night-Out Against Crime, and the observance of October as National Crime Prevention Month. In addition, the Association features “St. Clair Counties Most Wanted,” “Crime of the Week,” & a crime prevention tip of the month in local printed publications and on radio broadcasts. This program was built on a solid foundation of support. Its members have provided, through their collective thoughts and ideas, many of the suggestions mentioned. The combination of these community spirited individuals and the Police Department is taking the fight against crime in our city, one step closer to victory.

Assessor's Report

The 2014 Taxable Value (assessment) Notices will be mailed to you by the end of February 2014. On March 15, 1994 Michigan voters approved a constitutional amendment known as Proposal A. This amendment was designed to limit the growth of property taxes to the Inflation Rate Multiplier, until ownership of the property is transferred. Prior to Proposal A, property taxes were based upon the state equalized value (SEV). With Proposal A, the taxable value is the value that property taxes are now based on. For 2014 the Inflation Rate Multiplier is 1.6%.



Generally speaking, this means unless the current year's SEV is less than the previous year's Taxable Value multiplied by the Inflation Rate Multiplier, the current year's Taxable value will increase by the Inflation Rate Multiplier. If there was a transfer of ownership in 2013, the 2014 SEV and Taxable Value will be the same.

Actual sale price is not necessarily the true cash value of a property

The law defines the True Cash Value as the usual selling price of a property. The Legislature and the Courts have stated that the actual selling price of a property is not a controlling factor in the True Cash Value or State Equalized Value as calculated by the Assessor. For this reason, when analyzing the sales for the assessment changes, non-representative sales were excluded from the analysis.

The following is a basic example of how to calculate your annual property tax for those with 100% Principle Residence Exemption (PRE) status:

\$50,000	X	42.3809/1000	=	\$2,140.25 (incl. admin fee)
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Assessing information is available online!

*This example is based on the 2013 tentative millage rate, as of 12/17/13.

News from the Treasurer's Office

Water/Sewer Bills: The water/sewer bills in postcard format were mailed on December 1st. If you did not receive your bill please contact the Treasurer's Office; in person, email—treasurer@cityofmarysvillemi.com, or by phone at (810) 455-1317. Bills are due on January 31, 2014. The current flat rate charge is \$354.14 for six months.

Winter Tax Bills: Winter tax bills have been mailed and are due on February 14, 2014. Tax bills paid through escrow are not mailed to the homeowner. A copy of the bill can be obtained on our website at www.cityofmarysvillemi.com. Please contact the Treasurer's Office with any questions or if you did not receive your bill.

Dog Licenses: St. Clair County dog licenses are being sold from December 1, 2013 through February 28, 2014.

Marysville Golf Course Memberships: Memberships for the 2014 golf season are now available *only* in the Treasurer's office.

Senior Citizen Water/Sewer Discount: Senior Citizens age 65 and older who own and occupy their homes from which they derive no income and have a total household income in the prior calendar year of \$20,000 or less are eligible for a 30% discount on the water/sewer portion of their bill. The refuse charge is not eligible for discount. Applications are available at the City Treasurer's office and an itemization of the total household income or copy of last year's MI-1040CR form is required. Condominium owners whose water/sewer bills are paid by their condominium association are to make application prior to June 15th for the July billing and prior to November 15th for the December billing.

Tax Deferment: Senior citizens age 62, eligible veterans, paraplegics, quadriplegics, totally disabled, and blind persons having a total household income in the prior calendar year of \$40,000 or less, may file an affidavit with the Treasurer after June 1st and before September 15th to defer payment of summer taxes. This means that the summer taxes can be paid at the same time as the winter taxes without penalty. Ask your Treasurer to assist you with this deferment.

Snow Removal and Parking Ordinance Reminders

- **Dumping Snow:** Please DO NOT shovel or blow your snow into the roadway. The pushing, dumping or depositing of snow or ice from any privately owned premises into or upon any street in the city shall constitute a violation of this Code and shall be deemed an encroachment subject to the provisions of section 4.37 hereof.
- **Snow Ordinance Parking:** No parking on any city street between 2am-6am from December 1st to April 1st.
- **Shovel Your Sidewalk:** Due to budget cuts, the city no longer plows sidewalks. Please be kind and shovel the snow and ice from your sidewalk for school children, walkers, letter carriers, etc.


