
## Cuttle Creek to Undergo Restoration

Beginning in late October, Cuttle Creek in Marysville Golf Course will become a more accommodating place for native animal, fish and plant species.

Under the guidance Michigan Department of Environmental Quality and EA Engineering, the project involves removing the golf course's irrigation pond and re-establishing the stream channel to allow fish to swim upstream past the golf course. In addition, the creek bottom, wetlands and floodplains will be restored to their natural state to encourage habitat growth for fish, frogs, turtles and native pollinators. Vegetated swales connected to wetlands and a new reservoir will be created to filter golf course runoff and improve water quality.

The construction phase will begin in late October and end December 31. Vegetation planting will occur in the spring of 2015.

The City of Marysville received a \$1.5 million grant from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency for the project. The City is currently soliciting bids for a general contractor. The Qualification Opening begins at 10 a.m. on September 26. Bids will be opened on September 30, 2014 at 10 a.m.

## Chrysler Beach Restoration Continues

### Boat Launch Temporarily Closed

Residents who've visited Chrysler Beach over the past two months will have noticed many changes at the site. In July and August the beach parking lot was regraded and paved and rain gardens and vegetated swales were added to improve drainage and decrease pollution runoff into the river. New sidewalks were laid and a small pedestrian bridge was built to span one of the vegetated swales.

During the month of September our boat launch will be closed while it is upgraded. The launch's sea wall was demolished and will be replaced with a more natural shoreline consisting of rocks and vegetative plantings. The launch itself will be regraded and widened.

Our Department of Public Services has performed much inkind work to improve Chrysler Beach. Thank you for a job well done.

### Water Department News

## Water Plant Construction Complete

The City of Marysville recently completed various water filtration plant construction projects totaling approximately \$5.6 million dollars. These projects were designed to renovate crucial water plant processes as well as increase the sustainability of water production. The capacity of the water filtration plant did not increase, as this was not the intention of the projects.

Some of the work included a new 30" intake structure, a new sludge vacuum system in the settling basins, a new roof structure over the settling basins, new sand filter media, new filter control valves, new bypass piping and valves in the finished water reservoir, new high service pump drives, and a new high service pump. The entire HVAC system and dehumidification system was renovated as well to control corrosion within the plant from excessive condensation. The water plant also took the leap into the 21<sup>st</sup> century with the replacement of its 1950's era control system with a new Ethernet based processor control with desktop and tablet control access.

## Smoke Detectors/Escape Plans Save Lives

Smoke alarms can make a difference between life and death in the event of a fire. In fact, nearly two-thirds of home fire deaths in the United States result from fires in properties without working smoke alarms. That’s why this year’s theme for fire prevention week (October 5—11, 2014) is ‘Working Smoke Alarms Save Lives—Test Yours Every Month.’

Working smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in a reported home fire by nearly half. Most homes (96%) have at least one smoke alarm; 75% of these are working. Nuisance alarms were the leading reason for disconnected alarms. In half of reported home fires in which smoke alarms were present but did not operate, batteries were missing or disconnected. Hard-wired alarms operate 92% of the time in the event of a fire; battery-powered smoke alarms operate 77%.

Fire can spread rapidly through your home, leaving you as little as two minutes to escape safely once the alarm sounds. Pull together everyone in your household and make a plan before a fire strikes. Walk through your home and inspect all possible exits and escape routes. Households with children should consider drawing a floor plan of your home, marking two ways out of each room, including

windows and doors. Also, mark the location of each smoke alarm. For easy planning, download NFPA's [escape planning grid](#). This is a great tool to get children involved in fire safety in a non-threatening way.

## Department of Public Services News

### New Recycling Guidelines

Our recycling guidelines have changed! Our refuse contractor Emterra now takes the items listed below. Recycling (in your blue or lime green container, one per household) will be picked up on Wednesdays.

#### ITEMS ACCEPTED FOR RECYCLING:

- GLASS – any color beverage bottles or jars. Rinse clean and discard lid, labels need not be removed.
- CANS – Tin or aluminum – soup, vegetable, fruit cans, etc. *Rinse clean and remove labels.*
- PLASTIC – #1 - #8 **NOW ACCEPTED!** Rinse clean and discard caps.
- NEWSPAPER – In addition to regular newspaper, glossy prints/ads are now accepted.
- CHIP/PAPER BOARD – Cereal, tissue boxes, etc. now accepted. *Please breakdown boxes!*
- MIXED OFFICE WASTE – Junk mail, flyers, office paper, magazines, phone books now accepted.
- CARDBOARD – Please ensure cardboard is cut to the size of newspaper and fits in bin.  
**NO PIZZA BOXES, PLEASE!!!**

CORRUGATED CARDBOARD may also be dropped off at our DPS yard, 200 East 14th Street. *Cardboard only-no packaging.*



### Marysville Trash Guidelines

- **Wednesday is our city’s scheduled pick-up day.** Trash, recycling, yard waste and bulky items must be placed at the curb by 7 a.m. on Wednesday to be removed that day. Our ordinance prohibits placement before 6 p.m. the night before. No larger than a 32-gallon trash can is permitted. The time of day refuse will be removed may vary depending on the volume of refuse being disposed of in the city.
- **Bulky Items:** Place by curb before 7 a.m. on Wednesday year-round. Call the DPS at (810) 364-8340 to check if an item is acceptable.
- **Paint: *Must be completely dried.*** To dry, please leave the lid off and put cat litter inside can to absorb paint. Set it *next* to your trash can.
- **Yard Waste:** Place grass clippings, leaves or small branches in a trash can marked with an “X” or in brown composting bags. Branches four feet or shorter may be in a neat pile next to the yard waste can for pick up. ***The last day for yard waste pick-up this year is Wednesday, November 26!***

## Department of Public Safety Reminders

**Dumping Snow:** Please DO NOT shovel or blow your snow into the roadway. The pushing or dumping snow or ice from any privately owned premises into a city street is not allowed per city ordinance.

**Snow Ordinance Parking:** There is no parking on any city street between 2 a.m.—6 a.m. from December 1 to April 1. This enables our DPS crew to better plow our streets.

**Shovel Your Sidewalk:** Our DPS crew no longer plows sidewalks. Please be kind and remove the snow and ice from your sidewalk for school children, walkers, letter carriers, etc. Snow and ice accumulation must be removed within 48 hours after a storm. Residents who leave town for the winter should make snow removal arrangements. For those who are elderly or disabled, please call (810) 455-1310 to receive snow removal assistance information.

## News from the Treasurer's Office

**Water/Sewer Bills:** You will receive your water/sewer/refuse bill in postcard format in late November. The postcard format enables the City to save money in postage, material, labor and equipment costs. Payment is due on February 2, 2015. The current flat rate charge is \$354.14 for six months.

**Winter Tax Bills:** Winter tax bills in postcard format will be mailed in late November and are due on February 17, 2015. Please contact our Treasurer if you do not receive either your tax or water bill. Tax bills paid through escrow are not mailed to the homeowner. A copy of the bill can be obtained on our website at [www.cityofmarysvillemi.com](http://www.cityofmarysvillemi.com).

**Dog Licenses:** St. Clair County dog licenses are being sold in the Treasurer's office from December 1, 2014 through February 27, 2015.

**Senior Citizen Water/Sewer Discount:** Senior citizens age 65 and older who own and occupy their homes from which they derive no income and have a total household income in the prior calendar year of \$20,000 or less are eligible for a 30% discount on the water/sewer portion of their bill. The refuse charge is not eligible for discount. Applications are available in our Treasurer's office and an itemization of the total household income or copy of last year's MI-1040CR form is required. Condominium owners whose water/sewer bills are paid by their condominium association are to make application prior to November 15 for the December billing.
