## Crossfire Grill Opens at Marysville Golf Course

If you love smoked meats you'll want to try the new Crossfire Grill which recently opened at Marysville Golf Course. Menu items include a selection of smoked and pulled meat sandwiches, ribs, chicken wings, hamburgers and hot dogs. You can complement your entrée with a choice of flavorful sides including jalapeño beans, southern slaw, smoked cheesy potatoes or chips. The grill is owned and operated by residents Chris and Holly Mader who will return a portion of the profits to the golf course.

Both golfers and the general public are invited. A picnic area has been assembled outside the little wooden building that houses the grill just outside the pro shop.

In addition to the grill, the golf course acquired a liquor license this past winter and alcoholic beverages are now available. Golfers may bring in their own empty coolers but must stock with beer or other drinks purchased from the course.

City officials are hopeful that the grill and the liquor license will bring more revenue to the course.

Crossfire Grill is open seven days a week from 11 a.m. until 8 p.m.

## News You Can Use—A Message from Mayor Dan Damman

### The Discussion of a Municipal Campus...We Will Want to Hear from You

There have been many rumblings around our city regarding the building of a municipal campus. You may have heard the discussion as it relates to a Recreation Center, a new City Hall or both. What I would like to do is to first—set the record straight, and second— move forward with the discussion as a community.

Although the Marysville Recreation Department boasts wonderful programs for the children of our community, it is not able to offer all of the programs that it would like for our kids and virtually none of the programs it would like for our older generations with the facilities that are currently in place. The Marysville Recreation Department has been designing its programming around what is available by way of infrastructure and has been limited in its program offerings by the same. The Recreation Department was given the old fire hall in Marysville City Park to host the majority of its programs and must rely on the gymnasiums owned by Marysville Public Schools for any programming that requires gym time. With after-school sports and school programs increasing, the use of the school district's gyms by the Recreation Department has become more limited and more difficult to secure. Further, the fire hall building itself is failing not only to meet the needs of the community but the infrastructure itself is failing. City Council has been asked to put money into the failing building and each time we are requested to do so, it becomes more obvious that we are putting tax dollars into a structure that will never meet our needs.

Marysville City Hall is approximately 14,000 square feet and the upstairs has been virtually empty since the school district moved its offices to the new high school. We as a Council believe it possible to shrink the size of City Hall in a municipal campus, even when adding space for the artifacts in from museum, and use the space more efficiently. This would allow the property that City Hall currently sits on to be sold and developed into single family homes, putting this property back on the tax rolls. The new campus could include a new city hall, recreation center and space for our museum artifacts. If the project were to move forward, the city WOULD NOT seek to increase the millage rate.

There are many moving parts to this discussion, but we want you to be a part of it. I want to be clear that each of you who is a registered voter in Marysville will have a voice in the matter as we will be bringing the proposal of building of a municipal campus to our residents by way of advisory vote in November. As the summer progresses we will seek to have the Recreation Department inform you as to why a new recreation center would be good for the community and have some very preliminary drawings and a story board done to provide an idea as to what the campus could look like. We will continue to provide you with information as to why we believe we have a need for the project, what the project could entail, its cost, and how the city and our residents would benefit from the construction of a new campus. I believe in strong communication with our residents, and we will be using every effort to ensure that you are educated on the facts and not rumor. We hope that the dissemination of quality and accurate information will allow you to make an informed decision in November and cast your vote in what you believe to be in the best interests of our city. I look very forward to the future discussion of this issue.

## Road Repaving to Begin this Summer

The following roads will be paved beginning this July and ending in November:

- Lynwood / St. Lawrence: Approximately 0.39 miles from Gratiot to Busha;
- Virginia / 8<sup>th</sup> Street / Indiana: Approximately 0.25 miles north of 9<sup>th</sup> Street;
- New Hampshire: Approximately 0.78 miles from 18<sup>th</sup> Street to Huron;
- Vermont: Approximately 0.60 miles from 17<sup>th</sup> Street to Huron; and
- Delaware: Approximately 0.81 miles from Huron to Gratiot.

## News from the Treasurer's Office

**Water/Sewer/Refuse Bills:** You will receive your water/sewer/refuse bill in late June. Payment is due on July 31, 2015. The current flat rate charge for residences is yet to be determined.

**Summer Tax Bills:** Summer tax bills will be mailed in late June. Payments will be accepted beginning July 1 and are due on July 31, 2015. Please contact our Treasurer if you do not receive either your tax or water bill. Tax bills paid through escrow are not mailed to the homeowner. A copy of the bill can be obtained on our website at [www.cityofmarysvillemi.com](http://www.cityofmarysvillemi.com).

**Senior Citizen Water/Sewer Discount:** Senior citizens age 65 and older who own and occupy their homes from which they derive no income and have a total household income in the prior calendar year of \$20,000 or less are eligible for a 30% discount on the water/sewer portion of their bill. The refuse charge is not eligible for a discount.

Applications are available in the Treasurer's Office. An itemization of the total household income or a copy of last year's MI-1040CR form is required. Condominium owners whose water/sewer bills are paid by their condominium association are to make application prior to June 15 for the July billing and prior to November 15 for the December billing.

**Tax Deferment:** Senior citizens age 62 or older, eligible veterans, paraplegics, quadriplegics, totally disabled and blind persons having a total household income in the prior calendar year of \$40,000 or less, may file an affidavit with the Treasurer after June 1 and before September 15 to defer payment of summer taxes. This means that the summer taxes can be paid at the same time as the winter taxes without penalty. Ask our Treasurer to assist you with this deferment.

## Reserve Your Picnic Pavilion

Reservations for all pavilions are currently being accepted. Requests must be made in person with your driver's license in the Recreation Department, 1111 Delaware.

A \$35 fee will be charged to Marysville residents and a \$70 fee to non-residents to reserve a pavilion. Fees are non-refundable and all six pavilions are available for rental. To view pavilions and specifications please visit our website at [cityofmarysvillemi.com](http://cityofmarysvillemi.com).

Reservations will be taken for Saturdays, Sundays and holidays between Memorial Day and Labor Day. *Reservations may NOT be taken over the phone.*

Marysville City Park is open from dawn to dusk, seven days a week. Alcoholic beverages are allowed in the park but not in containers exceeding 15 ounces.

## Marysville Trash Guidelines

- **Wednesday is our city’s scheduled pick-up day.** Trash, recycling, yard waste and bulky items must be placed at the curb by 7 a.m. on Wednesday to be removed that day. Our ordinance prohibits placement before 6 p.m. the night before. No larger than a 32-gallon trash can is permitted. The time of day refuse will be removed may vary depending on the volume of refuse being disposed of in the city.
- **Bulky Items:** Place by curb before 7 a.m. on Wednesday year-round. Call the DPS at (810) 364-8340 to check if an item is acceptable.
- **Paint: Must be completely dried.** To dry, please leave the lid off and put cat litter inside can to absorb paint. Set it *next* to your trash can.
- **Yard Waste:** Place grass clippings, leaves or small branches in a trash can marked with an “X” or in brown composting bags. Branches four feet or shorter may be in a neat pile next to the yard waste can for pick up.

## Recycling Guidelines

Recycling (in your blue or lime green container, one per household) will be picked up on Wednesdays.

### ITEMS ACCEPTED FOR RECYCLING:

- **GLASS:** Any color beverage bottles or jars. Rinse clean and discard lid, labels need not be removed.
- **CANS:** Tin or aluminum – soup, vegetable, fruit cans, etc. Rinse clean and remove labels.
- **PLASTIC: #1 - #8 ACCEPTED!** Rinse clean and discard caps.
- **NEWSPAPER:** In addition to regular newspaper, glossy prints/ads are now accepted.
- **CHIP/PAPER BOARD:** Cereal, tissue boxes, etc. now accepted. *Please breakdown boxes!*
- **MIXED OFFICE WASTE:** Junk mail, flyers, office paper, magazines, phone books now accepted.
- **CARDBOARD:** Please ensure cardboard is cut to the size of newspaper and fits in bin.  
**NO PIZZA BOXES, PLEASE!!!**

**CORRUGATED CARDBOARD** may also be dropped off at our DPS yard, 200 East 14th Street. *Cardboard only—no packaging or Styrofoam peanuts please!*

### Fireworks Use in the City

Residents are reminded that fireworks may not be used, discharged and/or ignited in the City of Marysville except on *the day before, the day of, and the day after a national holiday*. Fireworks may only be discharged from private property and all remnants from the fireworks must stay within that property. The owner of the property or individual who is in charge of the property is responsible for any violations of fireworks law.

Motorists are cautioned to pay close attention when driving near bicyclists and pedestrians as the warmer spring months lure people outdoors. Michigan has a growing number of bike lanes and thousands of miles of shared-use pathways that bicyclists can use and enjoy.

## Cuttle Creek Restoration Continues

### New features added to golf course.

Work continues at Marysville Golf Course as Cuttle Creek is restored to a more naturalized state.

The 18th hole is experiencing the most change as the entire creek bank and bed are being reshaped to create a friendly habitat for aquatic life and small mammals. A wooden pedestrian bridge was also erected near the hole. Native vegetation will soon be planted on the bare creek bank to promote habitat growth and to control erosion.

A pond originally designed to handle the course’s irrigation needs has been nixed as its capacity was underestimated. Instead of a pond a naturalized creek will be created and a pump house will be constructed. The structure, which will be installed east of the parking lot, will house two 40 horsepower pumps which will draw water from the St. Clair River to irrigate the course. Construction should be done sometime in July. In the mean time, irrigation water is currently being sourced from a city main.

Several holes on the course are receiving new features courtesy of general contractor Inland Lakes. Dirt extracted from the project is being repurposed into mounds on Holes 1 and 9. Making the holes more challenging, the mounds will greatly enhance the currently flat and runway-like golfscape.

According to Golf Superintendent Brian Lentz these features ‘would have never been done if it weren’t for the generosity of the general contractor.’

It will take about a year for the new features to be fully landscaped.

Cuttle Creek Restoration Project is occurring because of a \$1.5 million grant from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. The City of Marysville contributed a 20 percent match towards the project.

## Water & Wastewater Facilities Win Award

The City of Marysville’s recently completed Water and Wastewater Plant projects have received the coveted 2015 Project of the Year Award from the American Society of Civil Engineers, Southeastern Michigan Branch and the State of Michigan Branch. These are the third and fourth awards the City has won for these highly successful projects.

Previously the Water and Wastewater Plant project received the 2014 Project of the Year award from the American Public Works Association, Detroit Metropolitan Branch.

The goal of these projects was to maintain a constant supply of safe and reliable drinking water for the city’s customers and protecting our most valuable natural resource—the St. Clair River. Most notably a 2-million gallon retention basin was constructed to handle untreated overflow that may occur during heavy rainfall.

The cost of these projects totaled \$25.6 million, \$8 million of which was covered by the Federal AARA funding. To prevent elevated increases in our water rates, the remaining costs were either financed through low interest state loans or covered within our own budgets.
