



Water Plant

- Congresswoman Candice Miller toured the facility to see our real time Huron to Erie Drinking Water Protection Network of which we are on the leading edge. (Chair of network is Bari Wrubel.)
- Repainted 14th Street tower and installed a new mixer unit to prevent freeze ups during winter.
- Purchasing and installing two new mixer units to prevent freeze ups in other water towers.

Wastewater Plant

- Completed North End Pumping Station and eliminated \$60,000 in annual charges paid to Port Huron. Gained independence from utilizing Port Huron's sewage facilities.
 - Return on investment for North End Pumping Station expected to be eight years.
- Recent improvements/upgrades in Wastewater Plant resulted in higher efficiency and an annual cost savings of \$15,000.






